





"I have been a painter using oil pastels and acrylics, but became dissatisfied with the flatness of the art. I began gluing found objects onto the canvas, then creating the canvas by weaving it, allowing me to incorporate objects, textures and shapes and adding needle felting to push the dimensional limits of wall art, creating weavingfelting fusions that are 3D tapestries."

Martina Celerin is a Bloomington, IN resident. Although she earned a PhD in plant sciences and accepted a postdoctoral position as a molecular geneticist in the Biology Department at Indiana University, she has transitioned from scientist to artist. Her work is inspired by nature and her imagination, integrating materials, landscapes or emotions from her travels and experiences. Martina has presented talks, workshops and exhibitions throughout the US.

Each spinner will select yarn fiber and color for their exchange skeins. Once the exchange is made, participants can plan their rectangular piece to enhance the exchange yarns.

## November 13, 2024 Double Weave Pleats with Sara Nordling

Double weave pleats began as an inquiry for Sara Nordling. How do you get a knife edge pleat to form on the surface of a fabric? The basic technique, as it turns out, is not that complicated. Once she had figured that out, what kept Sara making them are the very things that interested her about weaving to begin with: they have a tactile quality that makes you want to touch them, and there are so many ways they can be played with. Double weave pleats also provided her with a series to use for her M.F.A. thesis show. Join Sara as she takes you on the journey of double weave pleats from the basic technique to the many ways she has used them in her work for her thesis and beyond.

Penny Marsh, Vice President opened the meeting due to the absence of our President, Sarah Grant Joriman at 6:55pm.

Ann Niemi will take notes due to Secretary Bev Zalewski's absence.

New members and guests introduced themselves.

**Secretary:** minutes from September 9, 2024, WGK, Inc. General Meeting were discussed and approved unanimously. Motion made by Susan Boyce and seconded by Nancy Boughton to approve.

**WGK, Inc. Position open**: Penny, VP requests that someone volunteer to manage the website since Bev has taken over the Secretary position and needs a replacement.

**Demonstrations:** Karen noted the participation in the Michigan Renaissance Fair and Northern Michigan Festival that she and Kal attended and provided demo to the event.

**Disaster relief donations**: Karen VW Asked that WGK, Inc. members make hats, mittens and scarves for North Carolina disaster victims that are to be sent to rural areas that were affected by storms. Karen can be contracted to accept items and have them sent to those in need. **Spinners on Wheels SG:** meet Wednesday 10-2pm at Parkview Club House Flax spin fibers other than wool and knit those fibers.

**Beginners Weaving Group:** Julie Burkey and Diane Wenger lead this new group that developed Karen VW and Terri F taught a beginning weaving class this last summer. The group will meet at 3644 Woodcliff Drive. They will be calling themselves the "Warped Women".

## Alex Friedman

While working as a model builder in an architectural office in Cambridge, Massachussets, Alex Friedman took an evening weaving class and became instantly fascinated with the many possibilities of woven textiles. This led her to a job in New York City, weaving shaped tapestries for the bulkheads of a fleet of Pan Am 747 jumbo jets. Since then, Alex has maintained an active tapestry studio. By

manipulating the warp, using eccentric weft, leaving slits, and/or adding embellishments, she creates unique dynamic surface movement. She has participated in solo and juried exhibitions in the US and abroad, including the Textile Symposium in St. Petersburg, Russia. She was an Artist in Residence in Surrey, England and her tapestries have been featured in the Art in Embassies program. Her work has received awards and been published in numerous catalogs and recent textile books. Alex served as the President and Co-Director of the American Tapestry Alliance, and currently serves on the Board of the Textile Arts Council at the deYoung Museum in San Francisco.

Patrice George recently retired from the Fashion Institute of Technology (FIT) where she was Associate Professor in the Textile Development and Marketing Department for 18 years. She specialized in woven textile design, history of the textile industry, and sustainable solutions for textile production. She fell in love with weaving as a high-school exchange student to Sweden; this interest grew at University of

Michigan. Post-graduation, she spent a year exploring textiles in India, then studied traditional handweaving in Sweden. In 1974, she moved to NYC to work as a handweaver/designer. In 1979, she founded her studio, Patrice George Designs, specializing in woven fabrics for interiors. Patrice later developed courses in computer-aided woven design for the School of Visual Arts, Parsons and FIT. She taught digital woven design at the University of Industrial Arts in Helsinki, Finland, as a Fulbright Scholar. She has also worked with global textile development projects in Jamaica, Mexico, and Laos.


