





## Retrospective: Ann Terwilliger WGK, Inc. Member

## The exhibit at People's Church runs September-October 27th, Tuesday-Friday 10-4, Sunday Noon

My life in art was transformed in 1973 when I enrolled in a design class at Mt. Mary College in Milwaukee, Wisconsin. The teacher was a well-known artist and nun, Sister Mary Remy. She was recognized for her creative designs and joyful teaching. She taught design using silk screen printing on fabric as the medium. We were taught in order to create designs, observation was the key, that everything in sight had the possibility to become a creative image, so our sketches evolved into remarkable designs. Organizing the designs on fabric created endless options. I was enthralled with the process and the seemingly limitless opportunities to experiment. This fascination led me to explore printed, quilted, woven, and tapestry mediums bringing much joy to my life. # MLH Zoom Monthly Lecture Series



## Monthly Lecture Series via Zoom - Second Wednesday of the month 7:00 PM EST

This exciting new series is being offered to all members of MLH as a FREE benefit of membership.

This series does require that you must be a member of MLH. This series will offer you 11 FREE lectures/speakers throughout the year on the second Wednesday of each month at 7pm.

The Zoom lectures will be recorded LIVE and made available through a limited, password protected access for registered MLH members up to 2 weeks after, unless otherwise noted.

## October 9, 2024 Weaving with Light and Air: Leno and Gauze Structures with Patrice George Leno is a specialty weave structure where warps "twist" around single wefts instead of running parallel to each other as they do in plain weave. Leno creates a structure with warp ends that do not slip wher spaced apart in the fabric. Leno twists can be created by hand, on the simplest looms, or by using a modified heddle system on looms with 3 or more harnesses. Leno is a perfect structure to use for lighter weight fabrics like curtains, scarves, shawls, and table textiles, but can also be used with heavy yarns for blankets, mats, and technical textiles.

## November 13, 2024 Double Weave Pleats with Sara Nordling

Double weave pleats began as an inquiry for Sara Nordling. How do you get a knife edge pleat to forn on the surface of a fabric? The basic technique, as it turns out, is not that complicated. Once she had figured that out, what kept Sara making them are the very things that interested her about weaving to begin with: they have a tactile quality that makes you want to touch them, and there are so many ways they can be played with. Double weave pleats also provided her with a series to use for her M.F.A. thesis show. Join Sara as she takes you on the journey of double weave pleats from the basic technique to the many ways she has used them in her work for her thesis and beyond.

Meeting opened by Sarah Grant Joriman at 7pm. Present: Members in Person: 38 Guests: 4 Members on Zoom: 7

**Refreshments:** Several members brought snacks for the refreshment table coordinated by Becky Stremler. Members brought their own beverages in an effort to reduce waste.

Secretary: Kati Meek moved to approve the May 13, 2024 meeting minutes, seconded by Julie Burkey. Motion passed.

Education: Karen VanderWeele introduced Julie Burkey, a new member, who will be in charge of storing all the guild's rental weaving equipment. Julie will have the sign-out forms for members to complete for rental agreements. Karen and Kal V. will be in charge of the guild's rental spinning equipment.

Karen reported that there were several opportunities to demonstrate fiber skills over the summer. Karen, Kal, Penny, and John had a great experience at the events. The demonstrations were held at Tillers International, the Scottish Festival, Michigan Renaissance Faire, and Michigan Fiberfest.

The following information was shared about each Study Group:

Spinners on Wheels meets on the third Wednesday of the month from 10-2 at the Parkview Hills Clubhouse.

4 Harness meets on the second Thursday of the month at 9am at the Parkview Hills Clubhouse and on Zoom. This year they are focusing on rag weaving.

Spin2Weave will meet in October (date TBD) to plan this year's project. The group usually meets three more times during the year before our guild's May meeting. Terri Feldt said they have previously produced a variety of projects which used shared hand spun yarns, their own hand spun yarns or a combination of each to create assorted sizes of woven projects. The mobius shawl of 2023-24 was their largest project so far. If you're interested in joining this study group contact Terri Feldt by email or phone.

Beginning Weavers will be led by Lauren Blackford and they will focus on towels. They will meet on September 17th at Diane Wenger's house.

Little Looms is led by Shari Glaser. She reports they choose flexible dates and times. They will meet on September 16th at 6:30 at Julie Burkey's house.

Yearbook: Terri Feldt distributed the new yearbooks at the meeting. She was recognized for the excellent job of putting them together and weaving the featured fabric inserts. Guild members thanked her for beautiful work.

Library: Kristi Chapman brought a large amount of books to share. She reported that Martha Reeves, a guild member for many years, has decided to retire from weaving. Martha donated 42 books to the Guild. Kristi added nine of Martha's books (new to our library) into the library collection. The 33 duplicate titles are available for members to own, please make a donation to the Guild.

MLH: Nancy Reile reported that the MLH Biennial Fiber Arts Exhibit is open in Mt. Clemens, MI until October 16. Two of our members have pieces in the exhibition: Nancy Crampton, and Marta Williams. Marta was recognized with an Honorable Mention award. MLH has over 150 members from all over our state. MLH is offering monthly Zoom lectures. The annual conference and workshops will be held June 5-8, 2025 at the Ralph MacMullen Conference Center in Higgins Lake.

Treasurer: Shari Glaser presented financial reports for June, July, and August. In June Shari posted dues income from 67 members to begin our fiscal year. The \$156 Zoom license was an expenditure in August. Ann Mehring moved to approve the treasurers reports, Nancy Thornton seconded. Motion passed.

Vice President: Penny Marsh commented on the upcoming programs. The October mini workshop by Amy Tyler for spinners still has 4 spaces available. It's geared towards advanced beginners and above. The fee is \$30 plus a \$20 materials fee.

Coming up in November is speaker Martina Celerin with amazing 3-dimensional weaving. Next April will feature a twill workshop by Martha Town, more details to come soon. Tonight's speaker, Rabbit Goody, will present on Zoom. She will discuss Colonial American weaving. Penny belongs to an East Coast study group focused on coverlets and is impressed with Rabbit's expertise.

**Door Prize:** Tonight's door prize is an assortment of bobbins from the Jackie Strong estate sale. Diane Wenger won the door prize.

#### Show and Tell:

Bev Zalewski showed a workbasket on legs woven in a Fiberfest workshop taught by Bev Larson.

Rita Swartz showed a transparency woven in a recent MLH workshop.

Julie Burkey showed a runner woven in her introduction to weaving class. She wove plain weave and clasped weft techniques. She also showed a basket weave hot pad woven on a little loom.

Kati Meek modeled a vest which was woven from exchanged handspun yarns. Sarah Grant Joriman modeled a dress she sewed of linen.

The Business Meeting was closed at 7:40pm. Penny Marsh moved to close, Julie Burkey seconded. A short break was taken. WGK, Inc. General meeting 9-9-24 continued

Introduction of Featured speaker (on Zoom):

Rabbit Goody of Thistle Hill Weavers in Cherry Valley, New York.

For more than 30 years Thistle Hill Weavers has been weaving custom fabrics, carpet and trim for designers, home owners, museums and the film industry. Rabbit Goody's studio specializes in creating accurate historic reproductions, working from surviving examples, documented patterns and period weavers' drafts. Her work covers a wide range of periods.

Her work can be seen at George Washington's Mount Vernon, Thomas Jefferson's Monticello, Martin Van Buren's home in Kinderhook and the Lincoln Birthplace.

Rabbit focused her talk on the 1780-1840 Post-Revolutionary time period. She has studied textile history and believes one must always go back further in history to identify patterns. She spoke of "vernacular" weaving, everyday common and useful woven items. This was domestic weaving done by family members. Not many drafts exist for these items as it was so ordinary and done without a "recipe". This included sheets, blankets, table linens, shirts, horse blankets. Usually plain weave or a 2/2 twill was woven with linsey woolsey or worsted wool. Linsey Woolsey was a cellulose warp and a protein weft. The vernacular drafts most often found are for woven coverlets. The most common looms were 2-4 shaft counterbalance timber frame looms.

There are many drafts (recipes) from expert weavers, journeymen. These items were fancy and woven on 24-32 shaft counter marche looms. The items were fancy items— something one couldn't weave at home. Many were figured/carpet coverlets. A family took their own yarn to the journeyman weaver, he wove it, and charged a substantial fee. These professional weavers created drafts, many of which still exist today.

Rabbit read from the archived letters of Hannah Hayden to give us insight as to how much yarn, flax, and toil was needed to supply necessary woven items for a Colonial household.

WGK, Inc. Board Meeting September 24, 2024 Zoom Present: Sarah Grant Joriman, Penny Marsh, Shari Glaser, Bev Zalewski Meeting called to order at 3:04

Shari moved to approve the August board minutes, Penny seconded, motion passed.

Sarah reported that she developed an online membership form. She'd like a couple board members to test it. It will allow people to use a QR code at a meeting and fill the form out online. This membership information will be automatically viewable on a spreadsheet. Shari hoped this will combine with the spreadsheet used for the yearbooks. Shari recommends that Gary Feldt have access to the guild Google account as he has been very helpful integrating forms that Shari uses. Next month Sarah will give the board members access to the Google account that she has set up.

Penny is in the process of creating a flyer for the October meeting, a save the date for the Martha Town workshop, and a save the date for the December guild meeting. Martha will be covering 4 and 8 harness twills in the April workshop, she is designing a new workshop for us. We need 10 paid attendees for the workshop but can take up to 15. Judith Jones is hosting Martha and will attend the workshop with no fees. Discussion took place determining the per person charge for the workshop. Sarah stated that the yearbook already published a price of \$150 per person. It was felt that price should be adhered to although it leaves no room for any minor additional expenses. We must have 10 paid attendees to cover the mileage, room rental, and Martha's workshop cost.

Penny will plan to keep the October meeting 'In Person only" as spinning lends itself to hands on. A microphone has been purchased which should help with future business meetings on Zoom.

Penny had the new rack cards printed in a quantity of 500.

Shari reported we now have 84 members! Shari did not have the September financials complete as it wasn't the end of the month. She reported income has come from library book sales, membership dues, workshop fees, and equipment rental. Expenses were the September speaker fee, rack cards, microphone, and yearbook. She was notified that our insurance rate will be raised approximately \$25. She has an upcoming meeting with the insurance agent to update the policy.

Shari said WMU needs more information for the requested intern (archivist of guild materials.) We need to create a job description and provide a supervisor (with a Master's degree) for the intern. We discussed the need to determine what materials are in the boxes that Nancy Thornton is storing. The board plans to select a January date to organize the materials.

Bev reported that the website hosted by WIX is continuing on the monthly payment plan at this time. We will revisit this issue next month. Laurie Martin has renewed her membership, we'd like to know if she is experienced and serious about keeping the website up to date. We discussed the possibility of using Facebook with a public and a private page. Penny received advice from Betty of Duneland Weavers, who felt Facebook, if current, is a vibrant tool.


